## **Health and Safety for Trappers**

It is the responsibility of the group co-ordinator to have the relevant health and safety requirements in place when trapping, and to make sure all volunteers involved also understand the risks/procedures. Here are some of the potential hazards to consider when undertaking pest animal monitoring and control to help you with your health and safety planning.

Injury from handling live or dead animals	Animal still alive in trap (trap did not kill cleanly)	<ul> <li>Dispatch animal or if not confident to do so swiftly, contact your local DOC office or vet.</li> <li>Be aware of potential for scratches, bites and lacerations, and handle with care.</li> </ul>	Individual responsibility	First aid kit present
Exposure to infectious diseases and harmful pathogens	Animal still alive in trap (trap did not kill cleanly)	<ul> <li>Practice a high standard of hygiene (Cover broken skin before clearing traps, wear gloves, wash hands etc.)</li> <li>Only handle animals if you feel competent and confident to do so and/or ensure animal is dead before handling</li> </ul>	Individual responsibility	Seek medical advice if feeling unwell after handling animals or equipment.
Member of the public/child injured by trap	Unprotected trap use in public places and around children	<ul> <li>Traps must be housed in a closed tunnel with a warning label/contact information of Community Group responsible for the traps</li> <li>Tunnels must never be left open while unattended by a responsible and competent user</li> <li>Always seek permission from landowner before deploying traps and follow any regulations and guidelines stipulated by them</li> </ul>	Group leader     Individual responsibility	Administer first aid if present and required

## Procedures for trapping on council land (*ignore this section if backyard trapping*):

- \* Make sure that your traps are well-labelled with contact information for your group on the trap itself
- \* Traps or boxes should be clearly marked with a warning to prevent accidents or injuries
- \* Traps should meet NAWAC humane standards
- \* Away from vehicle or foot traffic (i.e. no less than 2 metres from a path/track)
- \* The location of all traps should be mapped (ideally with GPS locations recorded) and kept on file/TrapNZ

## **Tips for trappers:**

- \* Never set-off the traps without a suitable object to absorb the impact of the kill bar as this can cause stress to working parts and may result in breakage
- \* Be aware that unsecured traps can move and jump when triggered and do not lean directly over equipment while setting
